MESSAGE FROM THE CEO AND FOUNDER

CREATING OLYMPIANS ON AND OFF THE STRIP

In 2022, the Peter Westbrook Foundation renewed our commitment to fostering success in fencing and in life. We returned to full in-person learning and fencing instruction while continuing to follow safety guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), even as we exceeded prepandemic enrollment numbers.

We welcomed a record number of students to our Saturday Fencing Program thanks to the support of our competitive athletes, 100% of whom volunteer their time and expertise to train the next generation of elite fencers. We also saw a significant increase in the number of enrolled students in the Academic Enrichment Program (AEP), while keeping a 1:3 educator-to-student ratio.

The Peter Westbrook Foundation has an amazing culture, where parents and grandparents accompany their children every Saturday. Brenda Adams exemplified that spirit this year. She came to the Saturday Fencing Program with her grandson Amari every week without fail, brightened the mood for everybody and baked two cakes for our final Saturday together before the summer break.

That culture of giving and mutual uplifting is why youth and grownups continue to be a part of the Foundation. PWF scholar-athletes who have been with us for over 30 years are now parents, coaches, captains of industry and past Olympians. Yet, every Saturday they are here, giving back to the next generation. That is why we dedicate the 2022 Annual Report to the men and women who embody what it means to succeed in fencing and in life.

At the Peter Westbrook Foundation, we believe all youth, no matter their income, race or gender, should have access to quality programming in a safe environment with caring coaches, mentors, family and community support. SATURDAY FENCING PROGRAM

The Saturday Fencing Program offers hands-on training and instruction from a dedicated team that includes PWF staff, as well as Olympians and national team members. Each week, scholar-athletes—86% of whom are Black or Latino and 77% of whom are living under the average median income—train with these world-class coachmentors at all levels of fencing. Beginners are taught fundamental fencing techniques, footwork and bladework, while more experienced students hone skills and strategies that will help them approach the sport at a competitive level. PWF provides all necessary equipment, while coaches offer guidance on matters ranging from problem solving to healthy habits to self-confidence to overcoming losses. We are grateful that 100% of PWF competitive fencers continue to volunteer as coaches.

Since our inception, we have consistently sent at least one athlete to each Olympic Games, including the record number of four fencers who competed at the Games in Tokyo and a total of 16 Olympic spots secured by PWF athletes since 2000. Isis's hour-long commute

from New Jersey to the Peter Westbrook Foundation as a teenager was only the beginning for the globetrotting 29-year-old. She has already visited 28 countries, including Cairo, Egypt, this year to compete at the World Championships.

Isis is starting a new list, one of foreign countries she's lived in. For the past year, she has been staying with a host family in Bordeaux, France, where she's training at a farm with renowned epee coach and Olympian Jean-Francois DiMartino. Living in the

middle of France's wine-growing region comes with obvious fringe benefits, like learning to appreciate fine wines, cheeses and how to make the perfect crepe. Of course, Isis is brushing up on her already fluent French. The St. John's University graduate, who won gold at the 2015 NCAA Fencing Championships, is still working on her Korean, which she studied intensely during the pandemic.

As fencing clubs closed during the pandemic, Isis was left training in a coach's driveway when she was trying to qualify for the Tokyo Olympics. In the end, she would go to Tokyo as an alternate and training partner. It was bittersweet not to compete, but Isis is also grateful she was there to see Curtis McDowald and Yeisser Ramirez at their first Olympic Games. The two fellow epeeists, who both started at PWF the same year Isis did, were more than happy to have her support.

Ms. Brenda is known for spreading love, including when she baked two cakes for the Saturday before summer break. "I wanted to celebrate that we are surrounded by people who want the best for their kids and grandkids. My heart is all in on this," she says.

DARYL HOMER. SABRE

SILVER MEDALIST, 2016 RIO OLYMPICS: NO. 1 IN THE U.S.

"PWF isn't just a community program, it's a family," says Daryl Homer, 32, the first American fencer to have won Olympic silver as an individual in 112 years. "You learn to love the sport of fencing, then share it with the next generation because you were once those kids." He hopes to pay homage by ending his competitive career with a medal at the 2028 Games in Los Angeles, where Peter Westbrook earned a bronze medal during the 1984 Games.

CURTIS MCDOWALD, EPEE

NO. 1 IN THE U.S.

"I traveled to Europe as a teenager, paid for college and went to the White House as an Olympian. All because of fencing," says Curtis McDowald, 26, who juggles volunteering at PWF with training for the 2024 Games in Paris. "Being part of PWF means belonging to a bigger community, and that's why 100% of PWF athletes volunteer during the Saturday Fencing Program."

YEISSER RAMIREZ, EPEE

NO. 3 IN THE U.S.

"I'm impressed I went from Guantanamo to the White House," says Yeisser Ramirez, 36, the Cuban-born American for whom shaking hands with the President was a dream come true. His PWF community also celebrated, and so did his childhood friends in Cuba who flooded his social media when his White House visit was broadcast on Cuban television.

KHALIL THOMPSON, SABRE

NO. 4 IN THE U.S.

"We did a Zoom call with President Biden, which was very cool," says Khalil Thompson, 25, who still gives back every week and compares the PWF Saturday Fencing Program to a family reunion. "Everyone's your cousin...loving and supportive," he says. "We give back because we know it's impossible to make an Olympic team on our own."

ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

Many scholar-athletes take advantage of the Peter Westbrook Foundation's Academic Enrichment Program (AEP), open to grades 3 through 12. Our students have access to academic support and tutoring in a range of subjects, from writing to math. With a 1:3 educator to student ratio, students enjoy individualized attention from experienced tutors, including licensed teachers and accomplished professionals, as well as dedicated college and graduate students who balance course loads to help PWF athletes attain academic success.

Tanzima Ummi has been tutoring on Saturdays for three years and has no plans to leave. She is a recent college grad, who is considering a career in education because of her PWF experience. Among her students are two sisters, Grace and Olivia, who are both accomplished sabre fencers. "Tanzima's kind, patient and gives me great advice," says Grace, 11. Her little sister, Olivia, 8, agrees, "She helped me improve my sentence structure."

Tanzima, a Queens native, connected this year with another student over their shared Islamic heritage. "We were both fasting during Ramadan, and I suggested she take frequent breaks," the tutor explains. "For some, we're these older siblings, who've dealt with similar issues only a few years earlier."

The AEP also offers free test prep workshops for standardized tests like the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT). Additional workshops help advanced students in middle school prepare for the Specialized High Schools Admissions Test (SHSAT), an entrance exam required to get into New York City's highly sought-after selective high schools. Above all else, the AEP nurtures student-athletes in a supportive learning environment that encourages them to play an active part in their academic success.

PWF monthly essay contests are a great opportunity for our participants to research and form opinions on important current events, enhance their writing skills, and be rewarded for their efforts and excellence. One of this year's essay topics was "How would you respond to climate change deniers?" Students were evaluated based on their grade level (elementary school, middle school, high school), and the first and second place winners in each level received a \$75 and \$50 check, respectively. An additional \$50 check was awarded via lottery to a lucky student for their participation.

AKHNATEN "AKHI" SPENCER-EL, SABRE 2000 OLYMPIAN; U.S. NATIONAL COACH AS OF 2022

My mom had me join the Peter Westbrook Foundation to keep me out of trouble. I never thought that it would take me to all these exotic places, to the Olympics, or that I'd become an Olympic and National Coach one day. I give back on Saturday mornings so

another kid has the life-altering chances I had.

I competed in the 2000 Games in Sydney, Australia, but a lot changed for me around that time. I still loved fencing, but I was losing the desire to compete. It was Keeth Smart, my Olympic teammate in Sydney, who said, "You're good at knowing what I need to do on the strip. You should become a coach." I sought advice from the only American coach at that time, Buckie Leach, but I struggled to get students. Thankfully, Peter offered to send me to Semmelweis University, one of the best coaching schools in Budapest, Hungary.

My first elite athletes, Ibtihaj Muhammad and Khalil Thompson, shaped me as a coach. For one, I had to figure out a training program for Ibtihaj during Ramadan. I was so proud she won bronze at the 2016 Rio Games. I've been coaching since 2007 and was honored this year to be selected as the USA Fencing national Olympic coach. The Foundation kept me out of trouble, but it also let me find my passion.

DWIGHT SMITH, EPEE4-TIME USA NATIONAL TEAM
MEMBER; 3-TIME NCAA
ALL-AMERICAN

The Peter Westbrook Foundation prepared us to be successful at anything we wanted to pursue. I went to the Dwight School for high school on a fencing scholarship, then I was recruited to fence at Columbia University, where I majored in economics. I worked in finance for several years, but I just got hired

as an assistant coach at Long Island University. PWF athletes all have multiple options because Peter will help you find your niche.

Once I started fencing competitively at 14, I started volunteering on Saturday mornings as a coach-mentor because Peter created an environment that was conducive to giving back. But he wouldn't let just anyone coach his students. He supervised and coached us on how to train others to succeed. I'm not surprised so many PWF athletes have turned to coaching and are having this much success. After all, we've been doing it for so long.

If you want your child to succeed outside of fencing, you need to put them in fencing at PWF. From here, they'll succeed in their own way in anything they put their mind to.

Although I'd started taking fencing at my local rec center, joining the Peter Westbrook Foundation took my fencing to the next level. PWF opened many doors, exposed me to Olympic-caliber fencers and coaches, and helped cover the cost of equipment, lessons and travel. Plus, the mentorship and community helped build my confidence, and I created lifelong friendships. Being a fencer added excitement to my younger years, expanded my horizons, and enabled me to travel internationally, which planted the seeds for a life-changing move abroad.

PWF gives athletes this big-picture perspective that goes beyond fencing. For me it was the confidence to pick up and move to Panama and build a life there after college. I didn't have a job lined up, but within a month I got an internship at the United Nations. I built a career, made friends and started a family. PWF had given me a fighter's instinct, and at no point did I feel I couldn't navigate the combined challenges of coming into adulthood in a foreign land.

Peter puts out this aura that makes you want to give back. You just feel compelled to help because someone did so much for you. After spending 20 years abroad, one of the first things I did when I got back to New York was reach out to PWF.

Today, PWF is producing more athletes and expanding, but there's still that same core community feel. When you earn a medal, it's the Foundation earning a medal. You make it to the Olympics, that's a win for the whole community. It's incredible how this new generation of PWF fencers are jet-setting around the world and have a sense of purpose and belonging that is wonderful to see.


a restricted \$13.3 million. With an annual 3.5% payout, the goal is for the fund to continue to grow and supplement a portion of the Foundation's annual expenses.
